#### THE WORSHIPFUL COMPANY OF IRONMONGERS

Some facts about the Ironmongers' Company The Ironmongers' Company is ranked as the tenth of the Twelve Great Livery Companies of the City of London.

The Company received a Grant of Arms in 1455 and a Charter of Incorporation in 1463.

The Company Barge took part in many ceremonials and pageants on the River Thames including Lord Mayor's Day.

The Ironmongers had a bargehouse at Lambeth.

St Lawrence is the patron saint of the Company.

The staircase in Ironmongers' Hall has a carving of an ostrich with a horseshoe in its beak because the ostrich is known to have a cast-iron digestion!

A new barge built in 1763 had a cabin with thirty-six plate- glass sashed windows. It was sold in 1809.

But best of all... the barge was one of the Livery Company barges which took part in the funeral procession by water of Lord Nelson on Wednesday 8th January 1806.



#### **GARDEN REPORT**

The Lavender day was a great success last month. This hot-wall bed has been further enhanced by the planting of blue irises, white admiral phlox, hostas and soon to be planted, purple alliums.

The large old pear tree at the top of the tunnel entrance is to be professionally cut back to new growth which will mean it is reduced by about half, as the top is dead.

The red sycamore by the bothy is to be pruned and some smaller trunks removed as it makes too much shade in that area at the moment.

The large beech tree is to have the lower branches taken off so that we preserve the view of the Kymin and the Round House from the Britannia statue area of the garden.

The volunteer gardeners continue to garden, even though the garden is closed to the public until April 2019. The volunteers continue to tidy, sweep, rake leaves and prepare for putting the garden to sleep for a couple of months. Any fine Friday mornings will find a few 'Hardy Perennials' there! So...do join us if you can help.

Elizabeth Whittle has prepared a new planting plan for the garden. This will be discussed with the committee and volunteer gardeners on a Friday morning in early November.

#### **CONSERVATION & RESTORATION NEWS**

Tim Martin (of Context Engineering Conservation Services) and his team came to the garden this week to take away the sections of wrought iron and wood balustrade around the Nelson Pavilion.

They will return to install the refurbished balustrade in January or February 2019, The hardwood handrail will be repaired as needed using tropical hardwood to match,

This work has been made possible by the generous grant made to the Nelson Garden by the Worshipful Company of Ironmongers.
